- Career-shadow one or more people.
- Get an apprenticeship or internship.
- Visit colleges or trade schools.
- Organize a career fair.
- Publish a newsletter or create a Web page about careers for your school.
- Partner with one or more Girl Scout council staff people.

Fast Track: If you currently have a paying job or have started your own business and have put in 40 hours on it, congratulations! Your fast track career moves have allowed you to be promoted. You can use this experience in place of the above step.

## REFLECTION

Now that you have spent time exploring the world of work, write your dream job description. Some things to consider: Would you want to work in an office? A day job or night job? A job in which you help people? Build things? Create things? Use tools? Invent? Manage people? Use technology? Work outdoors? What product would you produce? How many hours a week?
